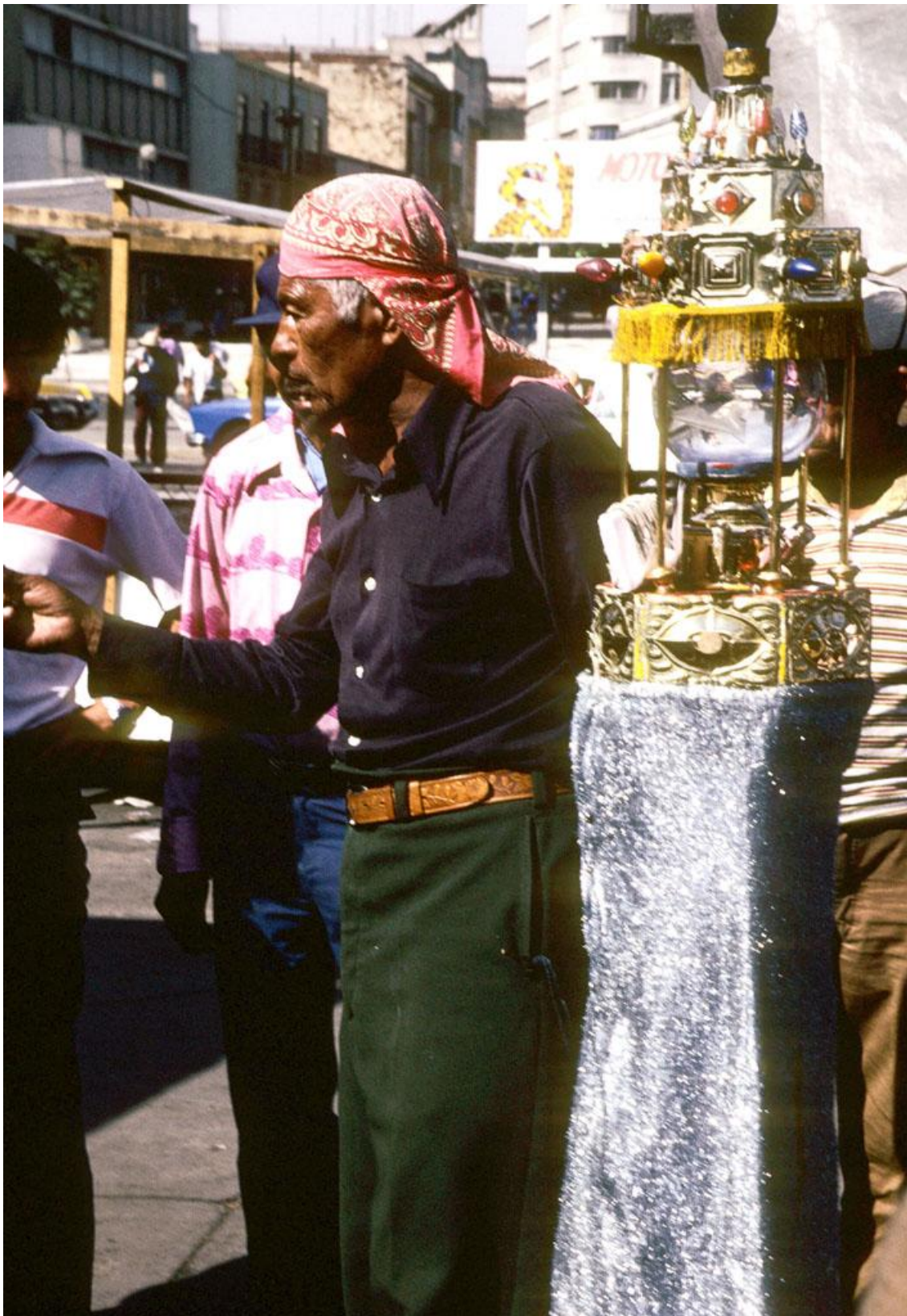


Fortune teller at Guadalajara's Libertad market
