grape (*Vitis labrusca*) thrives in North Carolina's piedmont ^[5] and mountain ^[6] regions. One variety of fox grape, the Catawba, was apparently first found along the banks of Cane Creek south of Swannanoa in Buncombe County ^[7]. Catawba wine also became a popular antebellum spirit well outside the South, fortifying Harriet Beecher Stowe ^[8] in her

literary campaign against slavery.
