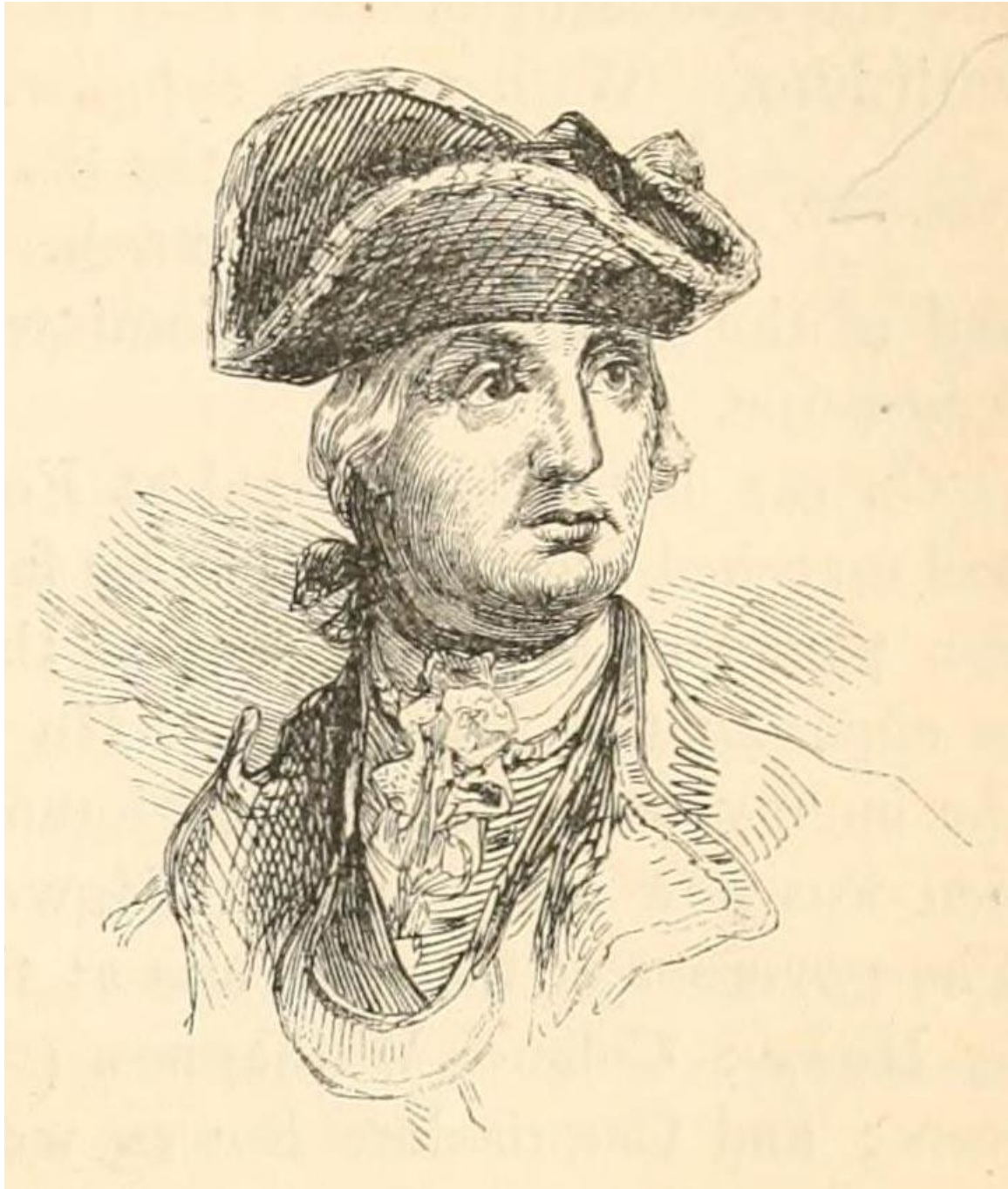


General Robert Howe

General Robert Howe

This is a portrait of General Robert Howe. It was published in Benson J. Lossing's *The Pictorial Field-Book of The Revolution Vol. II* in 1852. Robert Howe was a planter, soldier and politician from North Carolina. He was born in 1732 in New Hanover County. Howe became a member of the Committee of Safety for Wilmington and Brunswick Counties, and then he became an officer for training and drilling militia. He later became a colonel for the Second North Carolina Regiment and then a major general for the Continental Army.

Public Domain

Public Domain is a copyright term that is often used when talking about copyright for creative works. Under U.S. copyright law, individual items that are in the public domain are items that are no longer protected by copyright law. This means that you do not need to request permission to re-use, re-publish or even change a copy of the item. Items enter the public domain under U.S. copyright law for a number of reasons: the original copyright may have expired; the item was created by the U.S. Federal Government or other governmental entity that views the things it creates as in the public domain; the work was never protected by copyright for some other reason related to how it was produced (for example, it was a speech that wasn't written down or recorded); or the work doesn't have enough originality to make it eligible for copyright protection.
