According to Thomas Jefferson, when the matter of how the treasury would be funded was first discussed in 1776, there was debate in Congress over how to determine the amount of money each state should furnish to the common treasury. At first it was suggested that each state supply money in proportion to its number of inhabitants, however, there was not a common agreement as to who constituted an inhabitant. It was also suggested that property be used to determine a state's quota, but again, what constitutes property? Pages 43-49 of Jefferson's autobiography contain Jefferson's recollections of this discussion.

Public Domain

Public Domain is a copyright term that is often used when talking about copyright for creative works. Under U.S. copyright law, individual items that are in the public domain are items that are no longer protected by copyright law. This means that you do not need to request permission to re-use, re-publish or even change a copy of the item.
