Historic Sites. [3]In 1931, when Malcolm P. McLean [4] began working at a service station, North Carolina was rapidly becoming a major east-west transport route. Recognizing the potential for motor freight carrying, the Maxton native bought his first truck in 1934 and began hauling dirt for WPA [5] road construction projects. Later, he transported textiles to New York. By the mid-1960s, the McLean Trucking Company had become the fifth-largest trucking company in America, with a fleet of 5,000 trucks and trailers and 65 terminals scattered throughout 20 states. The Winston-Salem [6] terminal was considered the largest in the world when it was constructed in 1954.

McLean (who died in 2001 at age 87) sold his company in 1955 for \$6 million and bought a small tanker firm, which he renamed <u>Sea-Land</u> [7]. After becoming a pioneer in container shipping, he cashed in those shares for \$160 million in 1969.
