of North Carolina. The <u>Washington Monument</u> [2] in Washington, D.C., contains a block of North Carolina white <u>marble</u> [3] five feet long and three feet high bearing a sculptured bas-relief of the <u>state seal</u> [4] and the inscription "North Carolina <u>Declaration of Independence</u> [5], May 1775." It was presented to the Washington National Monument Society on 22 Feb. 1853 with a suitable address by Congressman <u>David S. Reid</u> [6] "in the presence of a numerous and distinguished company" gathered at the site. All 50 states, as well as many cities and patriotic organizations, have donated such memorial stones, which are located in the monument's interior.
