Not merely with the filial affection of a sou do we offer this tribute of love to the memory of a fond father, but as a public journalist do we thu honor the memory of so useful and worthy a citizen of our county and State as HENRY ADOLFHUS LONDON, who died at his residence near this place on last Monday morning, in the sev-enty-fifth year of his age. His illness was long and painful, and his death was not unexpected. For more than eighteen months he had endured severe physical suffering, and through out all those long, weary months of excruciating pain he murmured no at his Master's will, but with the resignation of the true Christian hhad patiently and uncomplainingly borne his sufferings, until finally his hour of deliverance came, and his spirit soared aloft,

Presented by DigitalNC. [2]Henry Adolphus London, merchant, was born in Wilmington, the son of John and Ann Mauger London. He obtained his early education in the schools of Brooklyn, N. Y., where his mother had moved following the death of her husband in 1816. After attending <u>The University of North Carolina</u> [3] in 1825, London entered the American Literary, Scientific and Military Academy in Middletown, Conn. (later <u>Norwich University</u> [4]). On his graduation in 1828, he returned to his native state and went into the mercantile business in <u>Wilmington</u> [5]. In 1836 he moved to Pittsboro to become a member of the firm of Evans, Horn and Company. When this company dissolved, he operated a mercantile business of his own until a few years before his death. In 1853 London became treasurer of the <u>Cape Fear and Deep</u> <u>River Navigation Company</u> [6], which had been organized to open a water route on the<u>Cape Fear River</u> [7] between Fayetteville and Gulf in <u>Chatham County</u> [8]. He served in that capacity until the company disbanded in 1868.

Active in the public and religious life of Pittsboro, London was chairman of the <u>Court of Pleas and Quarter Sessions</u> of thirty years. In 1870 he was elected to a two-year term as treasurer of Chatham County. For more than forty years he was a vestryman and senior warden of St. Bartholemew's Parish. From 1839 until his death, he attended almost every annual convention of the Episcopal Diocese of North Carolina. London died in Pittsboro and was buried in St. Bartholemew's churchyard.

On 29 Feb. 1832 he married Sally Margaret Lord, the daughter of William Campbell and Eliza Hill Lord of Wilmington, and they had ten children: John Rutherford, Ann Mauger (m. Lawrence J. Haughton), <u>William Lord</u> [10], Eliza Catherine (m. Dr. P. G. Snowden), Rufus Marsden, <u>Henry Armand</u> [11], Mary Cowan (m. Joshua T. James), Fanny Thurston (m. John W. Taylor), Frederick Hill, and Frank Olmstead. After the death of his first wife, London married Catherine S. Moore of Pittsboro in 1860. There were no children from his second marriage.
